	Initial working groups for these guidelines are working together again to finalize all guidelines. These documents are guidelines and will be reviewed yearly for updates.
	2nd assessment surveys to evaluate capacity gaps was sent out to all Providers to complete for early September. Surveys were closed the end of October. The surveys are in and the result summaries are almost complete. Each Team will receive the survey results to review with their teams. The Teams will come together to finalize.
	The Guidelines will be reviewed at the next CSS Network Steering Committee Meeting and the plan to spread to the Sector as well as outside the sector will be discussed.

A library of reports is currently being created that will allow all organizations within this collaborative to share reports. Goldcare has developed a comphrensive and easy to use RAI-CHA application that can be integrated with the Goldcare system or be used as a stand alone. Reports have been developed that assist assessors and management to understand the information and use it for care planning and program development.

	A power point presentiaon has been designed (under modificatioin) to target PSW students and employment/settlement agencies.
	The power point presentation will serve as the tool for CSS agencies introducing community personal support service to PSW students in class and educating employment /settlement agency staff on PSW as a career option for their clients.
	A concise One Piece Information Card has been developed to introduce CSS agencies as the major PSW employer and why community personal support service is a good option to consider. The card will be used by CSS agencies as a tool to connect with employment agencies, training institutes and potential employees.
	The group has planned to organize an Open House to network with employment/settlement agencies and PSW training institutions next April.

Development	Hospice Volunteer Program Development: Juliet Irish, Doane House Hospice (jirish@doanehospice.org)

	The "Bridging the Gap" collaborative was funded by the Ontario Trillium Foundation to develop a template "Communications" module for Hospice volunteer training. Doane House Hospice leads the partnership which includes students and faculty from George Brown College, The Hospice Association of Ontario (HAO) staff and volunteers from 5 other hospices, PalCare Network of York Region and a number of private sector participants. The project was intended to "bridge the gap" between knowledge holders in the hospice community and the people who understand the technology available to bring this knowledge to the community 24/7 online.
	The first phase of enriching the content of HAO's Volunteer Training Manual, through a call to 92 hospices in the province for video, photos, case studies and activities has taken place. Students and staff from George Brown College are converting these "assets" to digital format so that the content team can review and edit using wikis and blogs. Soon volunteers, clients and hospice expert testimonial videos will be recorded using new podcast technology at George Brown. We will also be involving a private sector partner to video tape demonstrations of communication techniques for streaming. All the updated text and multimedia content will be placed in a content management system and related data base created by students using open source software. The volunteers will be evaluated using gaming technology.
	When it is complete, volunteer coordinators from each hospice in the province will be able to engage their volunteers in the hospice movement immediately by sending them for training while they are motivated and interested. The coordinators will receive scores from their own volunteers' tests as they complete them.
	On April 4, 2011 at George Brown College non profit agencies will have the opportunity to see the final product, try out some of the technology and learn how the same process could benefit their agency.
